You may wish to consider these four styles of bequest giving through your Will.

- ***A particular item of property.*** A stated asset, such as one's farm, piano, or an issue of securities, is easily given through one's Will.
- ***A gift of cash.*** A specified sum of cash can be designated in your Will even when your assets are in another form. Non-cash gifts can be liquidated and the cash distributed.
- ***A percentage of your estate.*** Many persons give tithes of their estate to several causes.
- ***Remainder gifts.*** You may wish to direct that the church receive what is left after other loved ones have been provided for.
- ***Endow your annual gift to the church.*** By placing a provision in your Will, you can provide income to your church — the gift that keeps on giving.
